

Thousands of US Navy personnel received [advanced and specialized training](#) at Naval Training Center San Diego for nearly 75 years. At its peak during World War II, more than 30,000 Navy recruits, officers and staffers occupied the base.


Planned reuse: During ongoing cleanup operations much of the training center has been [transferred to the City of San Diego](#). Developers tapped [training center history](#) in retooling the center to a residential and commercial center named [Liberty Station](#).



Hunters Point Naval Shipyard Annex

SAN FRANCISCO

934 ACRES

1939-1988

Hunters Point was a [major repair facility for US Navy ships](#) during World War II and the years through 1974 when it was largely closed. The base also housed a Navy research unit that studied decontamination of ships exposed to atomic weapons testing. After 1975 a commercial company repaired ships at the facility.

Planned reuse: [DTSC's cleanup efforts](#) and those of [US EPA](#) have positioned Hunters Point for a [large-scale rebuilding project](#) that includes several thousand new residential dwellings and commercial buildings. The property is in a [San Francisco redevelopment area](#).

The Presidio

SAN FRANCISCO

1,491 ACRES

1776-1994

San Francisco's Presidio served for [more than two centuries](#) as a base for operations of Spanish, Mexican and US armies. The Presidio provided a point of assembly for troops headed to the Philippines in the Spanish-American War and coordinated defense efforts of the West Coast in World War II.

Planned reuse: Environmental cleanup continues through the authority of the [Presidio Trust](#) and under [supervision of DTSC and US EPA](#). The Presidio is part of the [National Park Service](#). Redevelopment and commercial leasing is ongoing, with major successes including conversion of Letterman Army Hospital into the [Letterman Digital Arts Center](#).




